POSTCARDS FROM FANTASY LAND:

Do You Live In The Real World?

TEACHER'S GUIDE

LEARNING OBJECTIVES

This session is designed to help students grasp the basic concept upon which this class is built: some times we do not live in the real world. We refuse to accept the realities that come with our choices until it is too late. We will also introduce Ecclesiastes as the book which can help us live in the real world.

PAGE-BY-PAGE TEACHING GUIDE

- Page 2 Have the students complete each project on this sheet, one by one, and then discuss each one as a class before moving on to the next. Our key point is in the bottom right corner. Introduce the concept that people do not always live in the real world. Use the case studies on the next two pages to illustrate.
- Pages 3-4 Give your students 5-10 minutes to read each story and answer the three questions. When they are done, discuss their answers. Emphasize that this is how people fail to live in the real world.
- Page 5 Break your class into teams and challenge them to come up with some examples of their own. This can be a difficult part of the assignment, so you may have to give them a little help. At this point you will probably be out of time. Give each of your students an index card and ask them to list one area of their life where they are most likely to abandon the real world for fantasy land. Let them work on this before coming back to class. Have them submit their responses anonymously. At the beginning of the next class, take up the cards and read them to the class.
- Page 6 Use this page to introduce your class to Ecclesiastes as the book which can help people live in the real world. Then, break your class into several teams and have them complete the first exercise. Ultimately what Solomon is searching for is the meaning of life. You work hard the few short years you are on this earth and what do you have to show for it that really matters?

Have the teams work on the question in the next box and discuss their answers. Make the point here that the writer's questions are fundamental, i.e. "Why do I exist?" "What is the meaning of life?"). Also emphasize that these are troubling questions. They make us think about things we don't like to think about. Finally, point out that these questions are serious; they make us take a serious look at life.

Wrap up by asking your students if they ever think about questions like these. Discuss how these questions force us to see life for what it really is - they make us live in the real world.

When It Really Matters

Sometimes it's hard to know the difference between what is real and what is fake. However, in the situations we've just described, the worst that can happen to us is that we can lose some money.

Consider this: some people do not live their lives in the REAL WORLD. Instead, they invent their own fake FANTASY LAND which allows them to ignore the realities all around them. When we do this, the consequences can be far more serious than just the loss of some money. It might cost us our most valuable possession OUR SOUL!
